At the beginning of the year, the Foundation was donated surplus garments from the 2014 West Mersea Town Regatta by the committee led by Sarah Sherwood. These were taken to Namibia, by trustees, Linda and Roger Bullen and distributed during their recent visit, to the San bushman families. These will be very useful during the coming winter in the next three months when temperatures fall to below zero during the night and we are very grateful for their generosity.

Roger and Linda have just returned from their first project monitoring trip this year. As reported in our last newsletter, Komeho were having problems trying to source a builder to carry out the remedial work on the superficial cracks. Roger and Linda completed a final inspection last month and Komeho will now send their own team to carry out the work when the school returns from its holidays in late May. Once this work has been completed, the Namibian German Special Initiative will deliver the lockers and then forty senior girls will be able to start using the dormitory. Unfortunately, progress is still slow by the

Namibian German Special Initiative Programme's (NGSIP) contractors and it looks as if they will not finish their part of the project until late 2015. Whatever happens, the Foundation's dormitory will be officially inaugurated in October 2015.

On their arrival in Windhoek at the end of February, Linda and Roger met with the architect and later were provided with detailed plans for the kitchen and dining area. They were then able to brief three builders who are currently in the process of compiling their estimates. Subject to funding being in place it is hope to start building in the latter part of 2015.

Vasdraai

Vasdraai is a resettlement farm situated 65 kilometres south-east of Gobabis in the Omaheke region. Until 1999 it was a commercial farm and was purchased by the Government under the 'willing seller, willing buyer scheme'. It covers a total area of 4,315 hectares and was subdivided into nine posts, plus the main farmstead which together is inhabited by 81 households of different ethnic groups who have been resettled by the government. Their main occupation has been cattle farming, and in common with communal areas in the region the farm is overgrazed causing the land to be degraded.

Komeho Namibia Development Agency, our partner ngo in Namibia has a major long term project at the farm which consists of re-generating the grassland with assistance from the Politechnic of Namibia and constructing a Vocational Training Centre at the main farmstead which they will run.

Water for the farm is supplied by four working boreholes and one redundant borehole, all of which need re-equipping with modern technology such as solar pumps and panels. Komeho have found a donor to fund four boreholes and the Foundation have sourced an organisation in the United Kingdom for the fifth.

They are *the*LONGWELLwalk charity based in Sheffield, and their aim is to deliver sustainable, long term water and sanitation projects. We look forward to a long and successful relationship. Their website is http://thelongwellwalk.org/.

Linda and Roger Bullen report on their visit and time spent volunteering in clinics

The Catherine Bullen Primary Healthcare Clinic

We arrived at the clinic in the late afternoon of 25 February after a nine hour drive from Windhoek. Everyone was pleased to see us and we settled into accommodation unit B1, our home for the next three weeks which was not without its challenges. As was evident during our previous visit, the clinic is very busy and on our first full day we became aware of an accident on the main road to the north. We were alerted to this by a school teacher who came speeding into the clinic requesting help as one of his pupils had been knocked down. With the ambulance already out, we put a mattress in the back of our Hilux and with another nurse we rushed to the scene. Here we found a small boy laying on the side of the road surrounded by a crowd of people having been hit by a minibus transport. It was obvious that the accident had been fatal, but not wanting to leave him in the dust and heat, we placed him in the back of our vehicle and took him to the clinic. At the other end of the spectrum we had a birth, although that was in the back of the ambulance some 30 kms on the road to Tsumeb. Once delivered the ambulance returned to the clinic with mother and its extra passenger, the baby, who both were well.

During our visit we met the Chief Medical officer for the region at Omuthyia to discuss the possibility of medical staff from Colchester General Hospital coming to the area to carry out voluntary work. We were also taken to the homestead of the sister in charge of the clinic where we tasted the delights of mahangue and spinach. A trip to Tsumeb one weekend gave us the opportunity to meet up with Derek Sherratt from Chesterfield who are twined with Tsumeb and support a kindergarten and Family Support Group which has refuge for victims of gender based violence. Derek kindly donated eleven trees for the clinic grounds.

Oshivelo Football team

Otjimanangombe Primary Healthcare Clinic Post 8

Having completed three weeks at Oshivelo, we drove cross country to Otjimanangombe in the Omaheke region to the clinic that the Foundation built and was opened in 2008. Here we experienced another set of challenges mainly to do with distance. For instance if an ambulance was called it would take at least two hours to reach the clinic and then another two hours to get the patient to hospital, subject to the condition of the roads, it being the rainy season. Again below is a selection of photos from our visit.

Family narrowly escape shack fire

Many families in rural areas and in informal settlements in the towns and cities live in corrugated metal shacks. These have no electricity or running water. The only means of lighting are oil lamps or candles. Unfortunately, shack fires are all too common resulting in some cases to loss of life. The week prior to us arriving at the clinic, Severn the clinic security guard lost all his and his families possessions when their shack burnt down. The fire was caused by a candle and his wife and children were lucky to escape with their lives.

Lifeline Clinic, Epukiro

Situated 80 kms west of Otjimanangombe, the Lifeline Clinic is a private clinic run by the Nankuse Foundation and focuses on the San Bushman Community. Volunteers from all parts of the world spend time there and British doctors take time out from the UK to practice in the clinic usually for a year. Currently, there are two doctors, Ian and Sharon who are joined from time to time, by a third, Tim. Tim's emphasis has been on educating the San on the symptoms of TB and preventing cross infection. He has also been involved in training Health workers in the community who observe and report any problems back to the clinic.

We stayed at this clinic for four days after leaving Otjimanangombe, working in the clinic and going out into the community with Tim. Just after we arrived, the clinic was notified of a problem with a San gentlemen in the local settlement. On investigation we found Simeon aged 21 years, who had suffered from TB of the spine and testicular cancer, both of which had been cured. Unfortunately, the TB had left him paraplegic and doubly incontinent. Simeon had been discharged from hospital with large pressure sores on his hips and ankles. It was his wish to return to his family, and while we were there, we went with the clinic staff to visit him twice a day to deal with his personal needs, change his dressings and lift him in and out of his wheelchair.


